- A. David Ronzani of Parks and Recreation passed out the meeting agenda and then proceeded with introductions.
- B. David Ronzani presented existing conditions, site analysis, goals and objectives, and Likes/Dislikes/Wants.
- C. Discussion/Comments/Ouestions:
 - a. Dislikes/Concerns with the current tot lot:
 - Noisy equipment
 - Lack of consistent maintenance
 - Chain-link fence around the perimeter needs to be replaced
 - Conflicting opinions about whether or not dogs should be allowed in the play
 - Concern about the drainage issue centering on the stormwater flow in the brick alley.
 - b. What is liked about the current tot lot and should be carried over into the new design if possible:
 - Small scale
 - Trees and available shade
 - Swings
 - The digger is a favorite piece of equipment
 - The large silver maple, though they would like to know the practicality of preserving it.

c. Additional improvements:

- Meet ADA accessibility and CPSC safety guidelines for use zones
- Maintain site lines through play area
- Reduce mowing
- Wood chips vs. sand, or alternative options
- Picnic tables
- Benches
- Bike rack
- Explore the possibility of redirecting some stormwater from the alley into a raingarden
- Plants for play, trees left undisturbed where possible
- Greens and tans in playground equipment. (i.e. House of Hope Playground), neutral colors
- Avoid equipment that resembles one that would be found at a fast food restaurant
- Use materials such as bricks and pavers to give the urban playground feel such as in Boston or New York
- Incorporate the Victorian character of the neighborhood into the design
- Drinking fountain dry well (away from sand), dog bowl on fountain
- Preserve community garden
- Raingarden off alley
- Swings oriented north/south
- Increased lighting/historic street lights
- Water source for the garden
