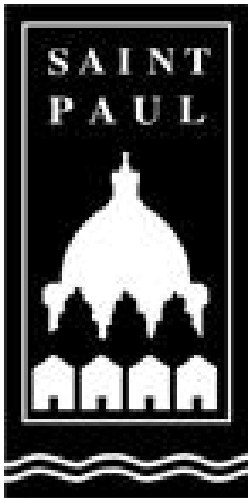

2010 Census

- ❑ Counts population
- ❑ Age, sex, race, and household status
- ❑ No more long form
 - Replaced by the American Community Survey

United States Census 2010

Use a blue or black pen.
Start here

The Census must count every person living in the United States on April 1, 2010.
Before you answer Question 1, count the people living in this house, apartment, or mobile home using our guidelines.

- Count all people, including babies, who live and sleep here most of the time.

The Census Bureau also conducts counts in institutions and other places, so:

- Do not count anyone living away either at college or in the Armed Forces.
- Do not count anyone in a nursing home, jail, prison, detention facility, etc., on April 1, 2010.
- Leave these people off your form, even if they will return to live here after they leave college, the nursing home, the military, jail, etc. Otherwise, they may be counted twice.

The Census must also include people without a permanent place to stay, so:

- If someone who has no permanent place to stay is staying here on April 1, 2010, count that person. Otherwise, he or she may be missed in the census.

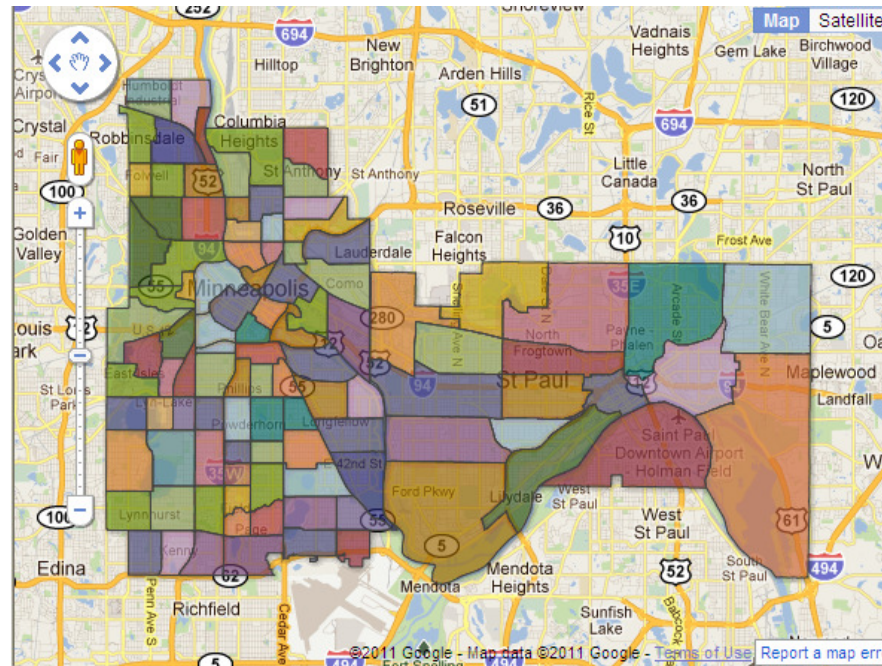
U.S. CENSUS BUREAU

American Community Survey (ACS)

- Replaces census long form
 - \approx 2 million households respond each year (about 2%)
 - 1,3, and 5 year estimates with margins of error
- Asks about:
 - Age
 - Sex
 - Race
 - Family and Relationships
 - Income and Benefits
 - Health Insurance
 - Education
 - Disabilities
 - Where you work and how you commute
 - Where do you live and how much you pay for essentials

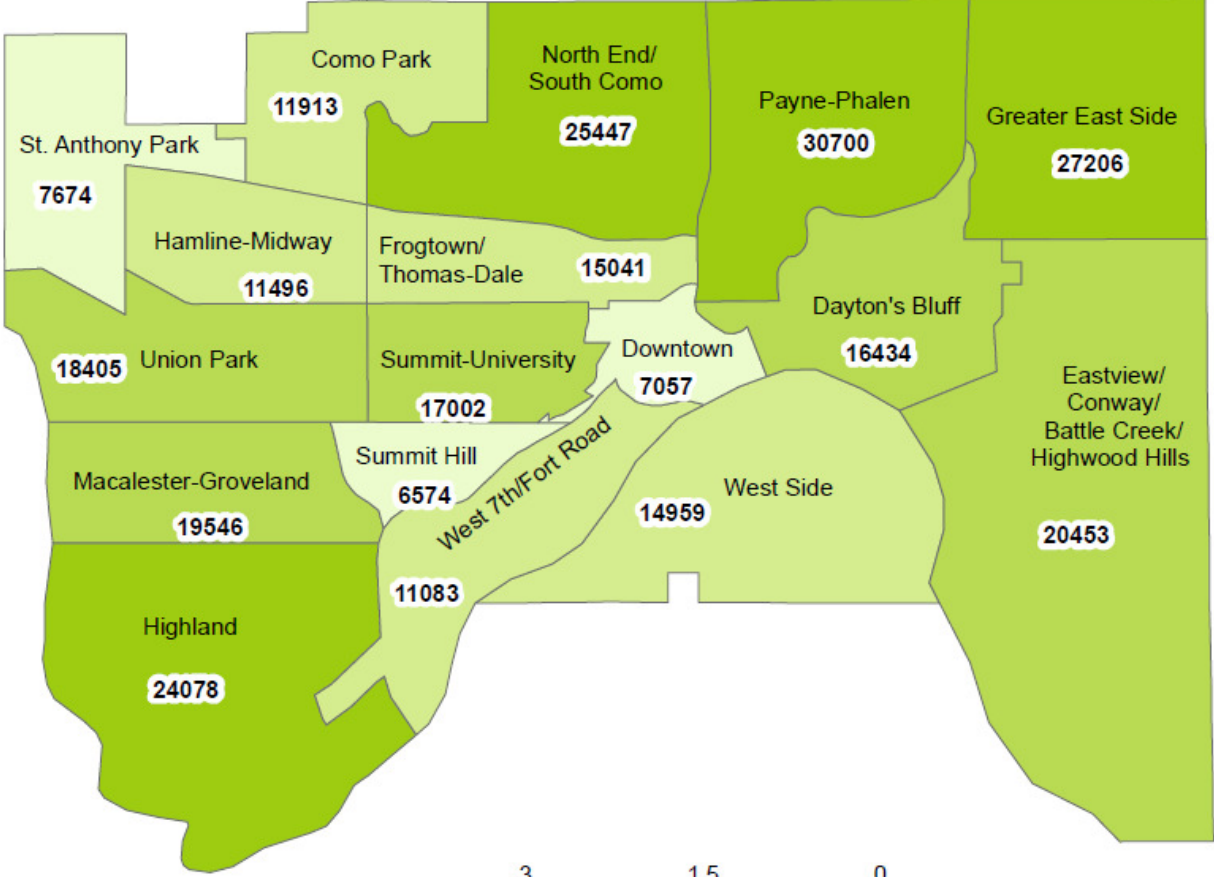
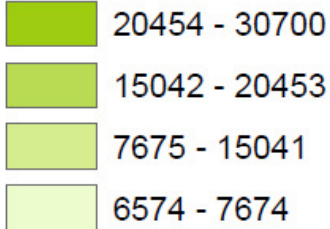

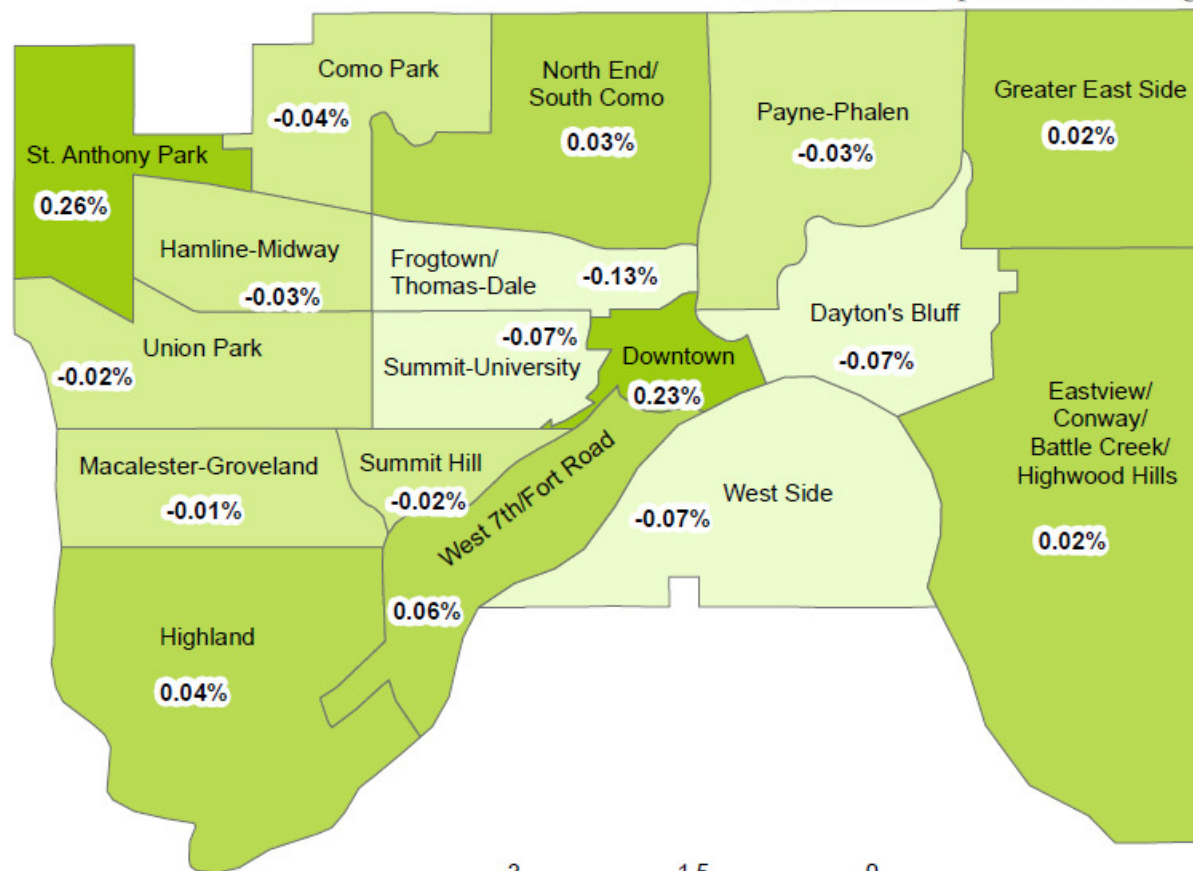


Change in Population by District 2000 - 2010

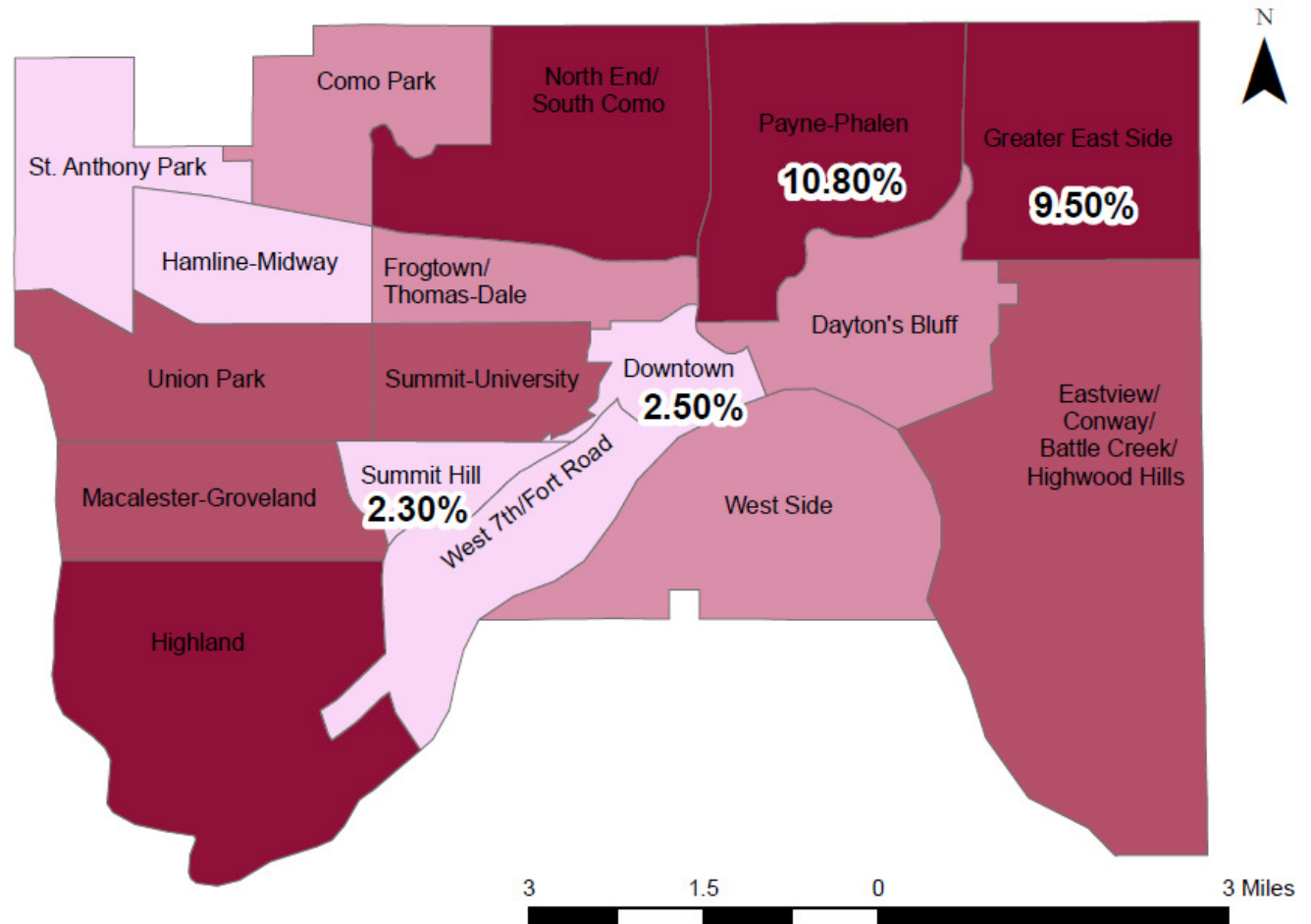

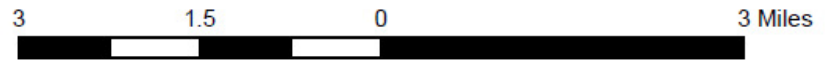
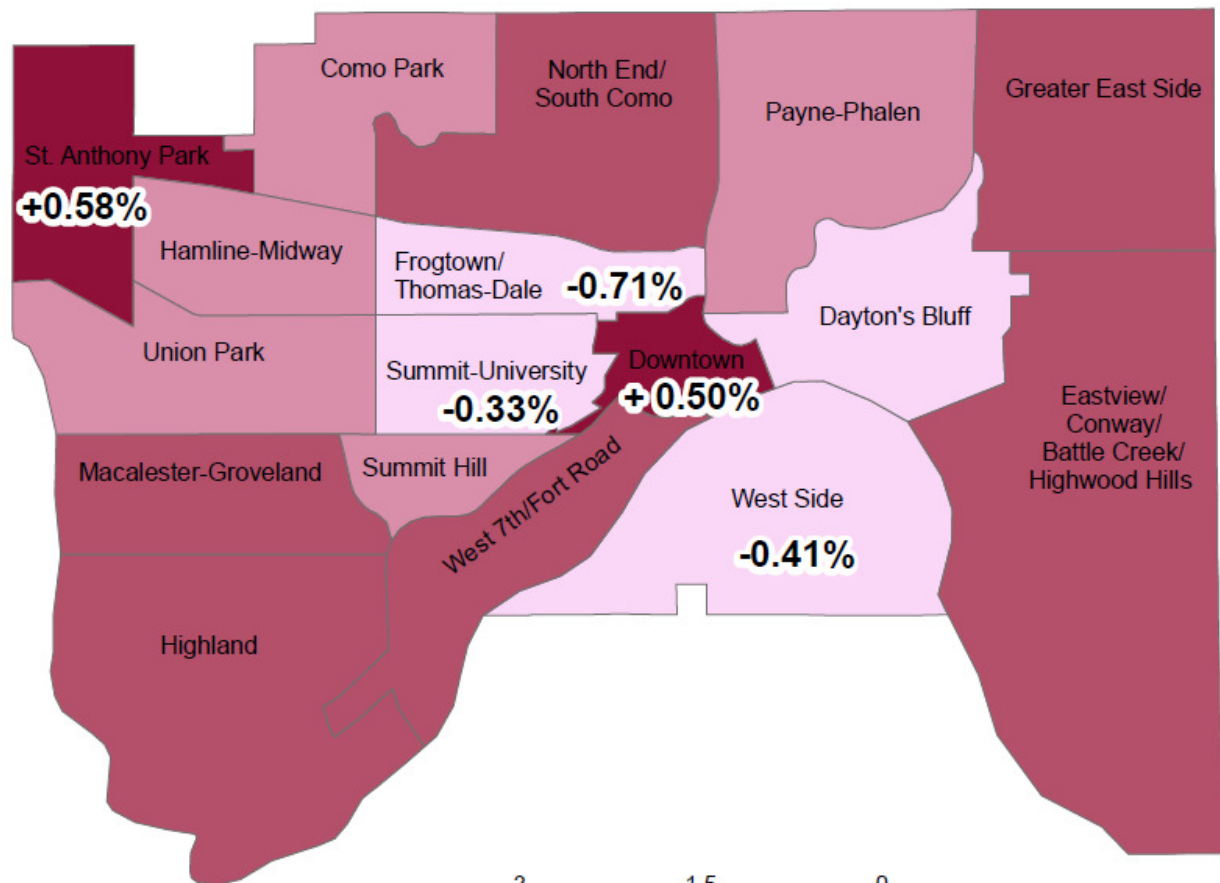
Change in Proportion Population, 2000 - 2010

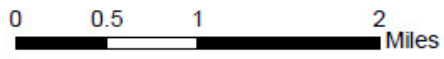
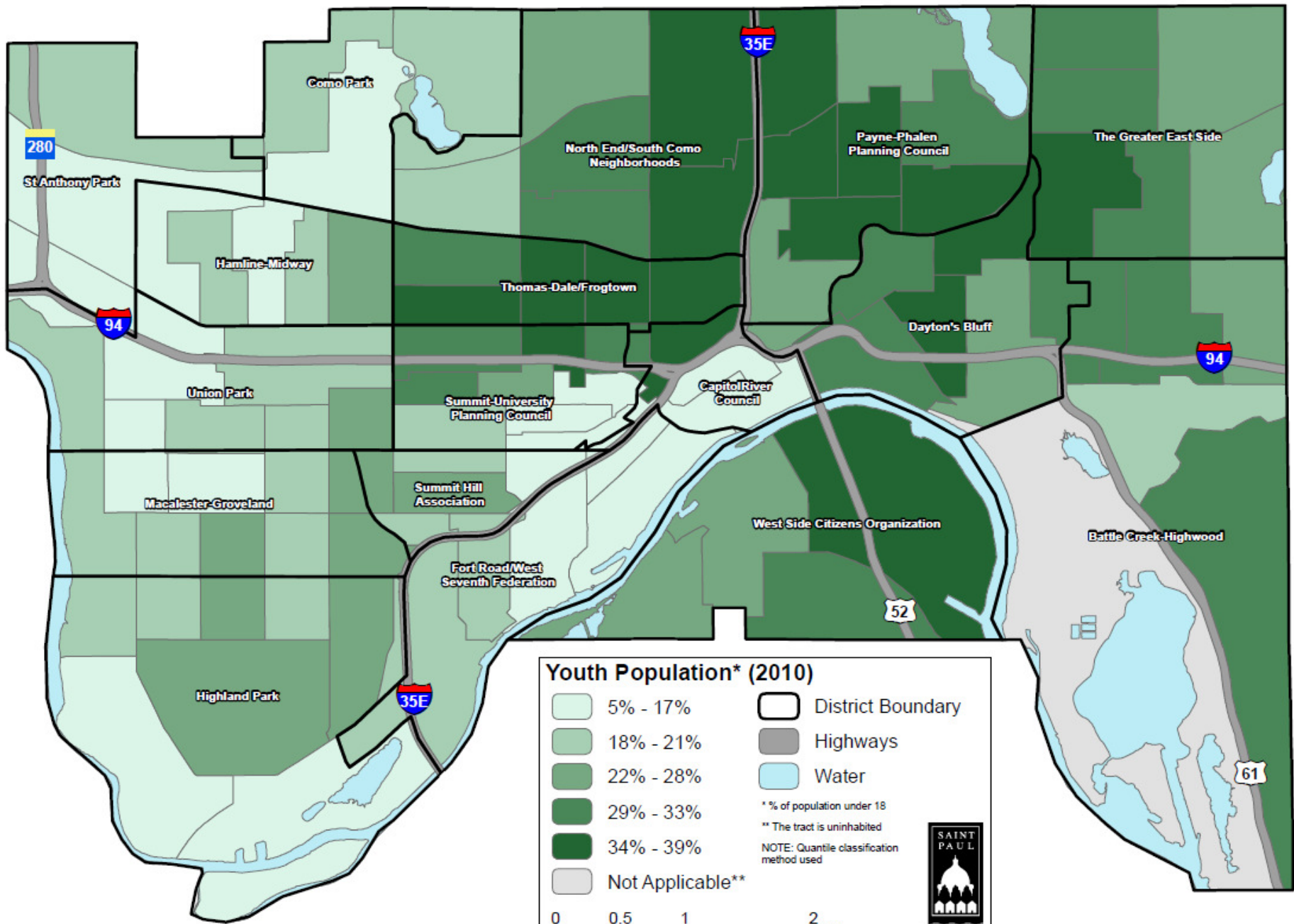


Proportion Under 18 Population, 2000-2010

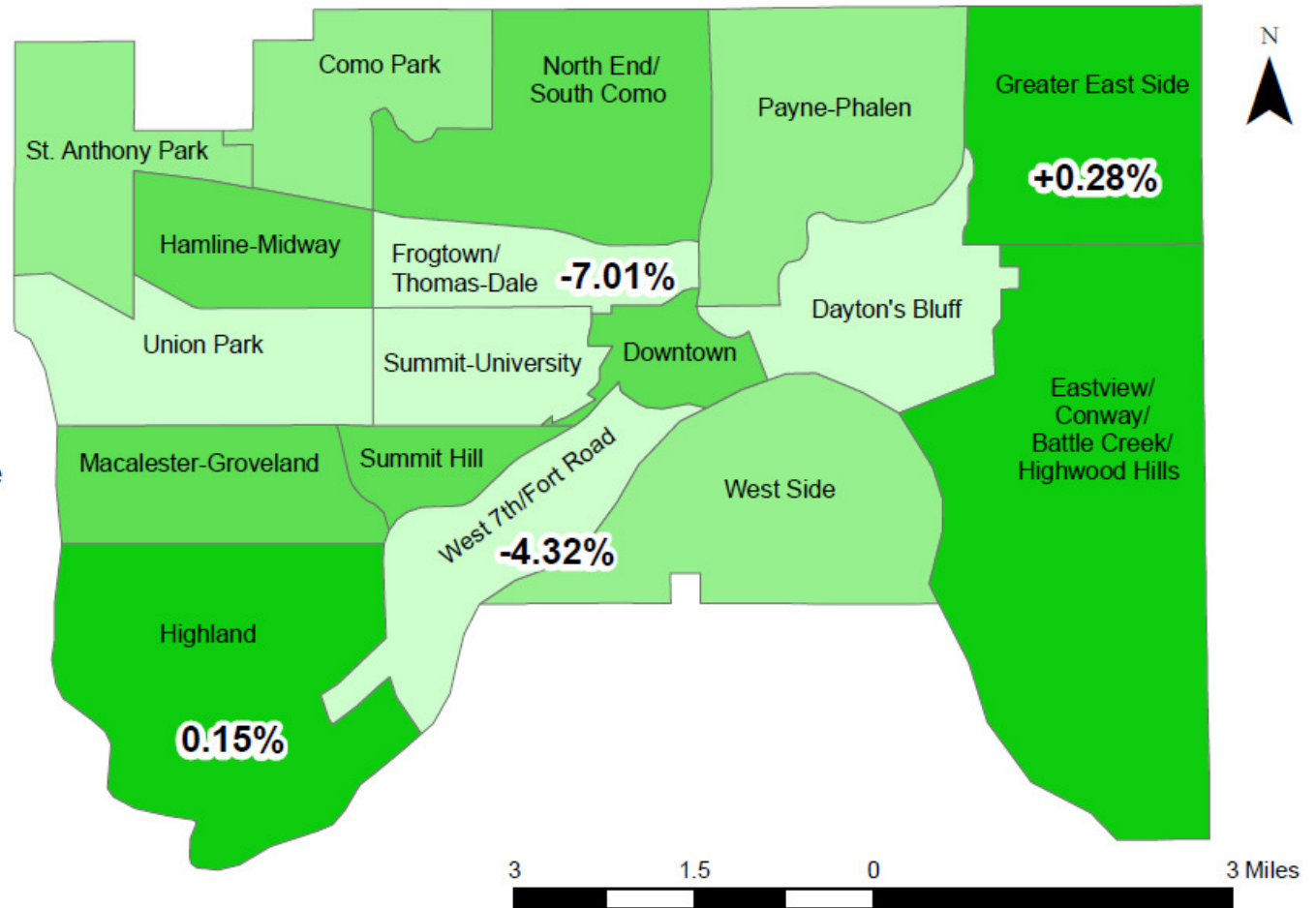
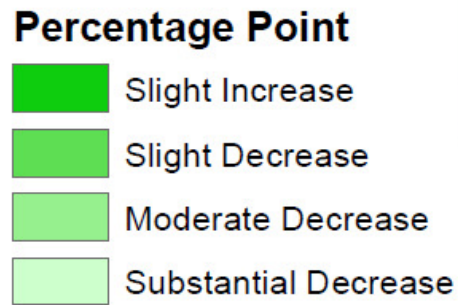

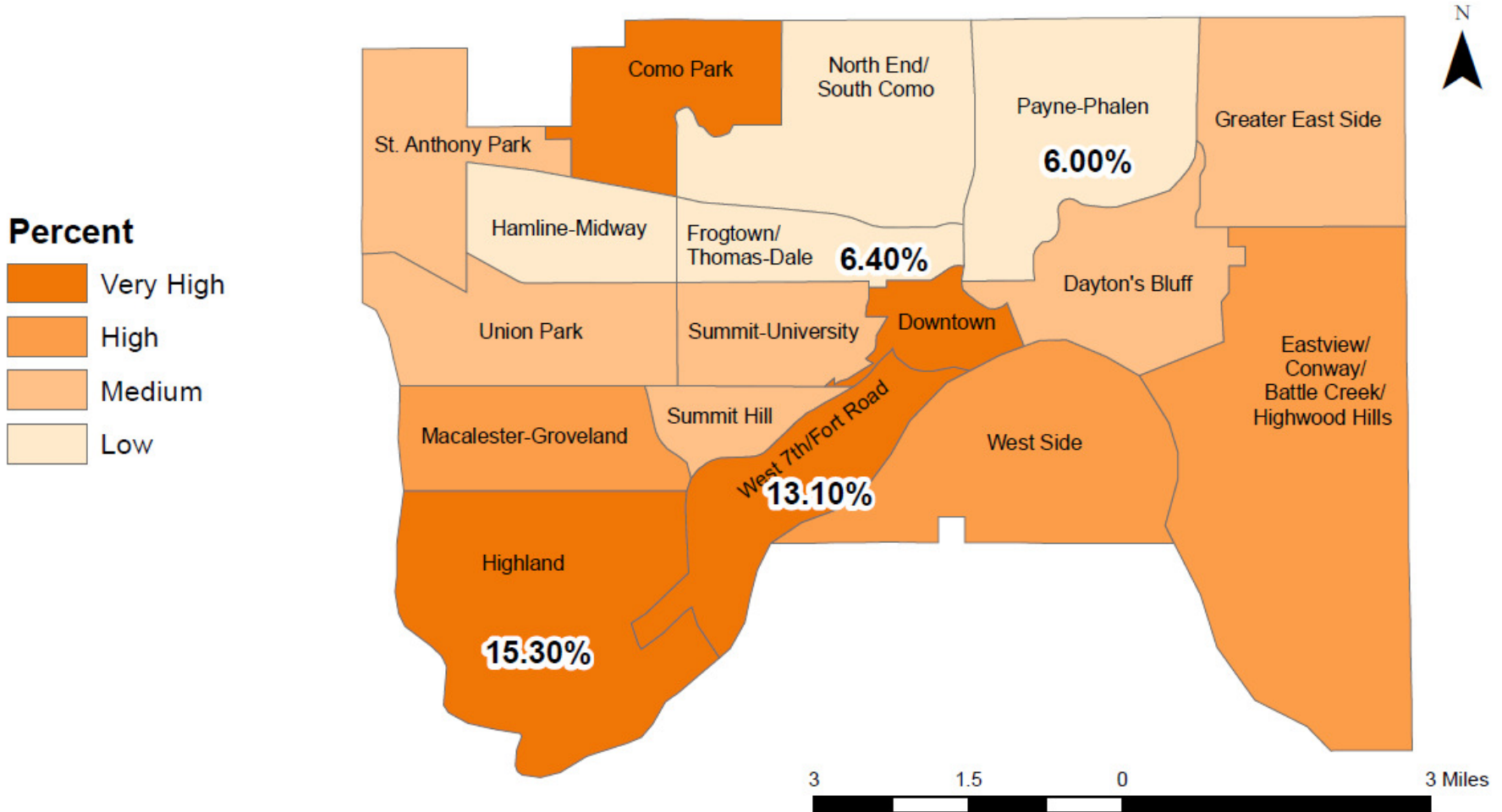

Change in Proportion Under 18 Population, 2000 - 2010

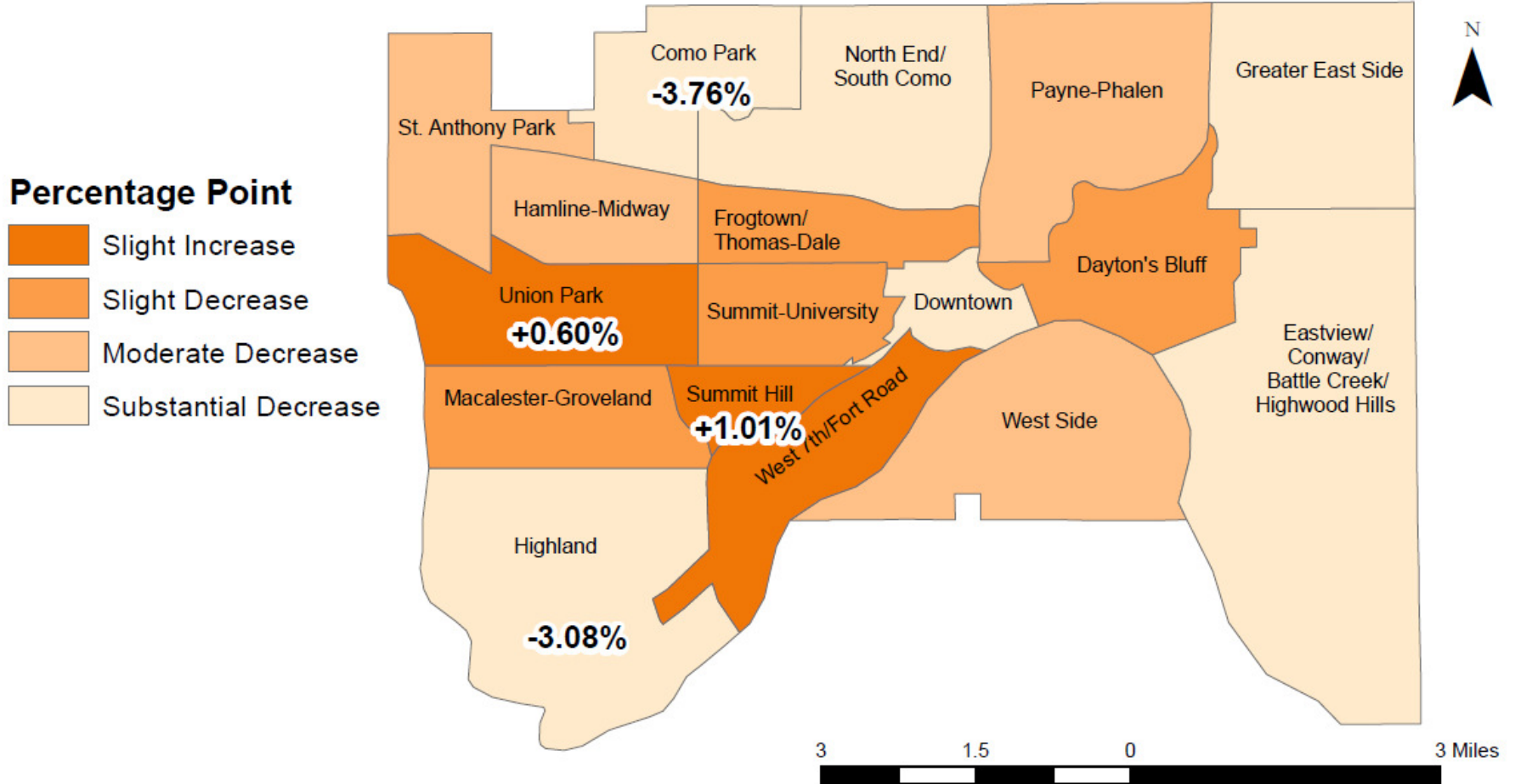


Proportion Over 65 Population, 2010

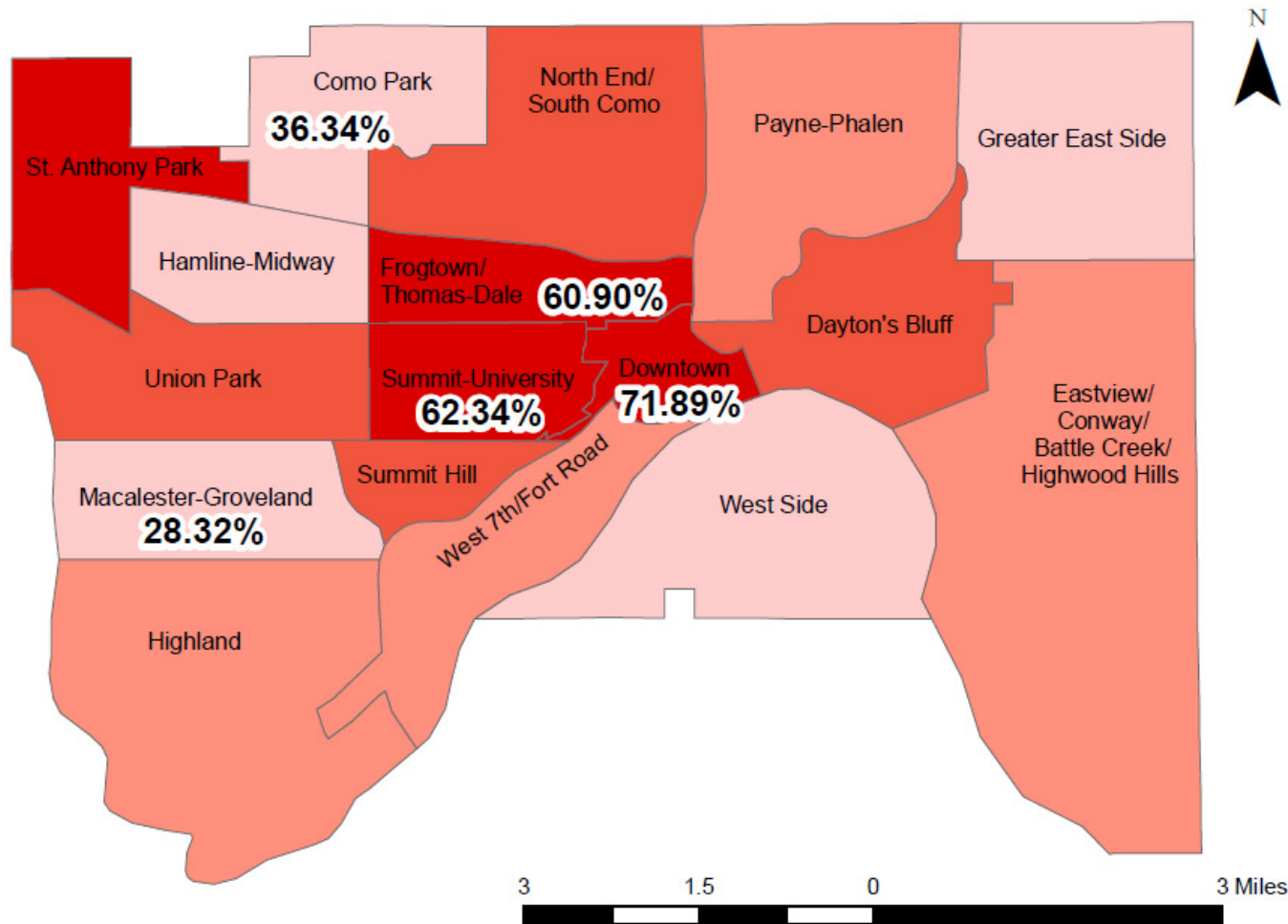
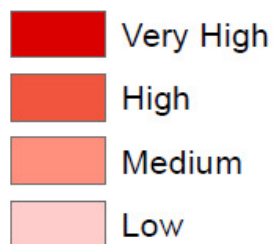
Change in Proportion Over 65 Population, 2000 - 2010

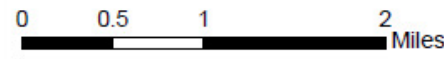
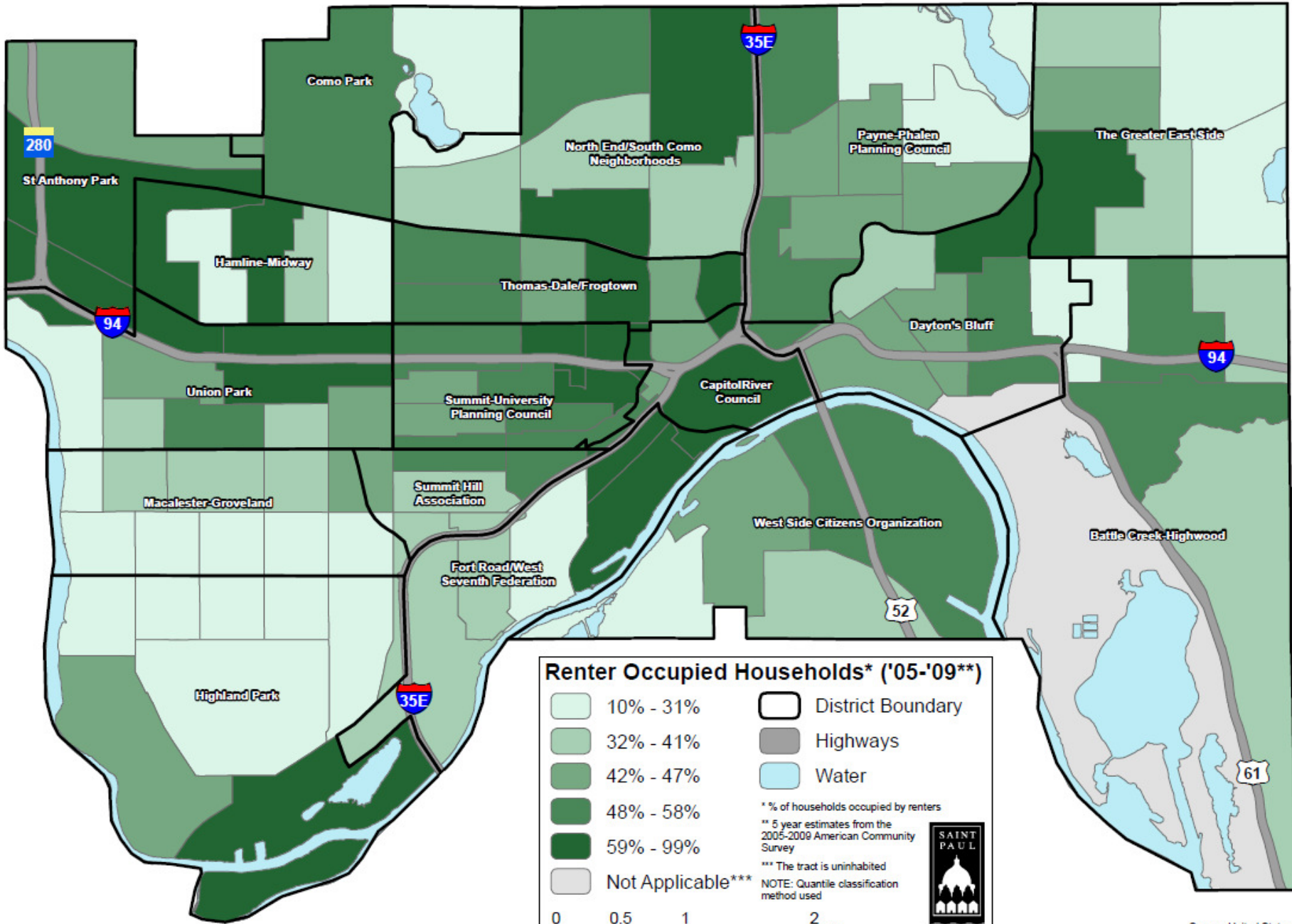


Proportion Rental Population, 2010

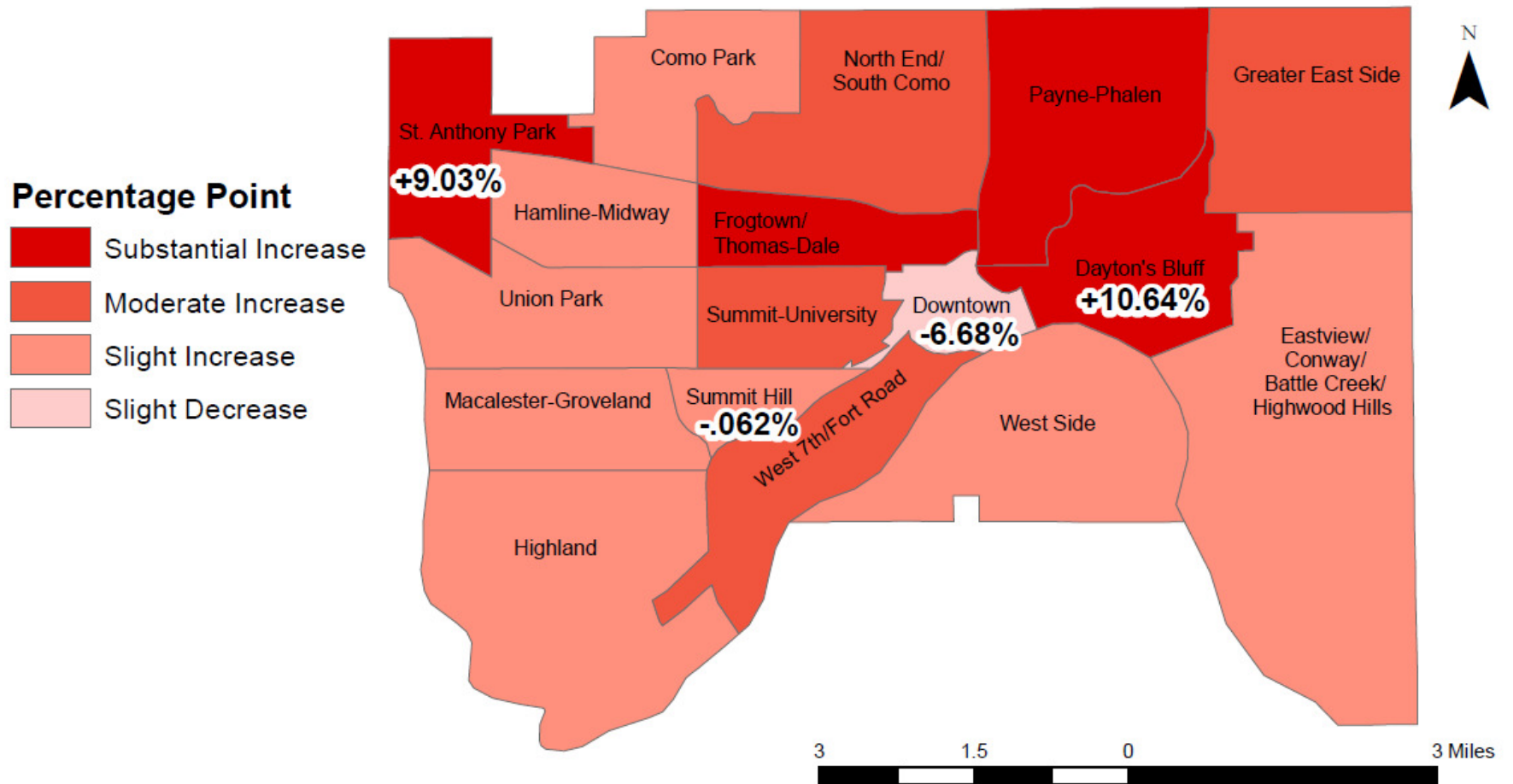




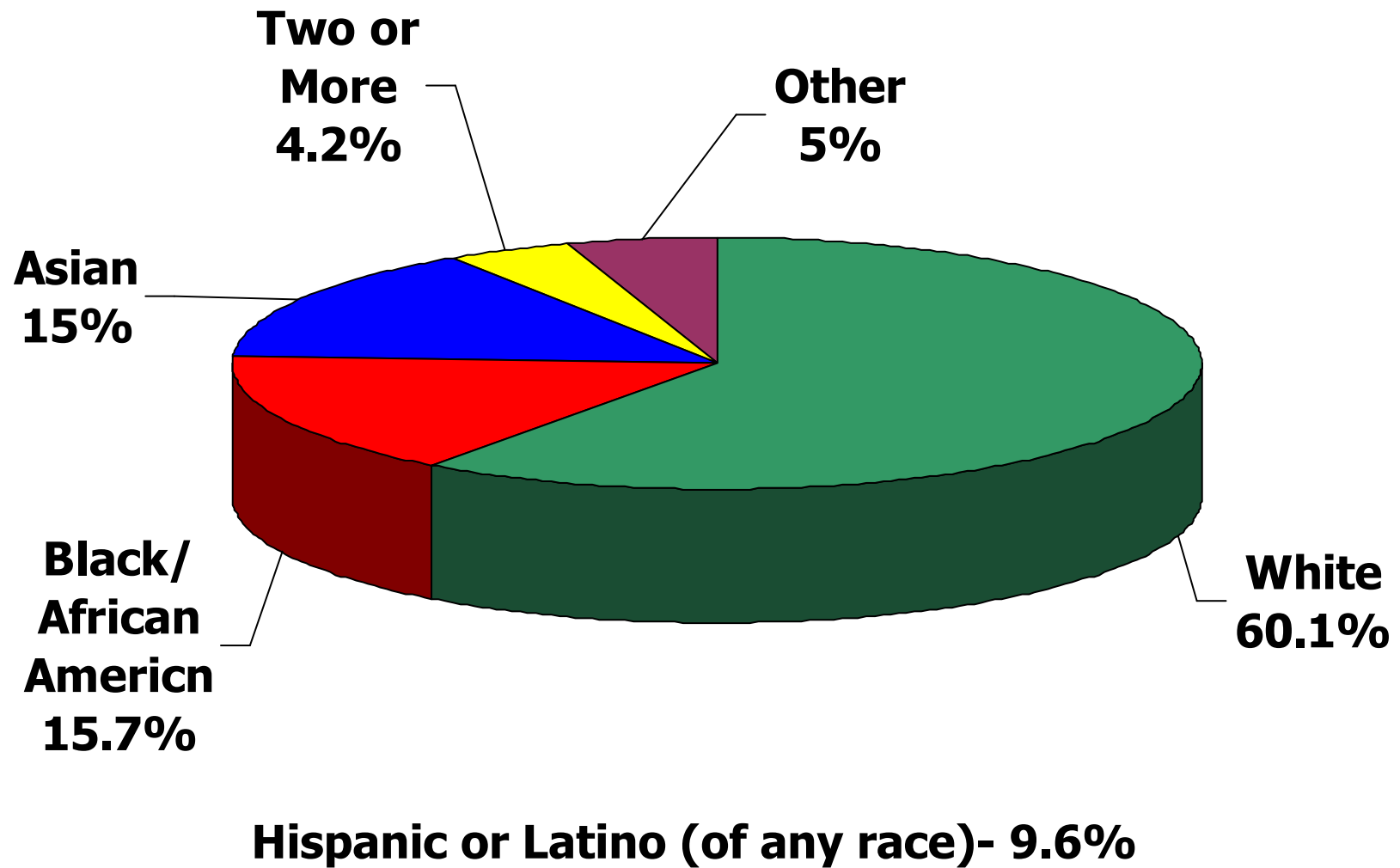


Proportion White Population, 2010

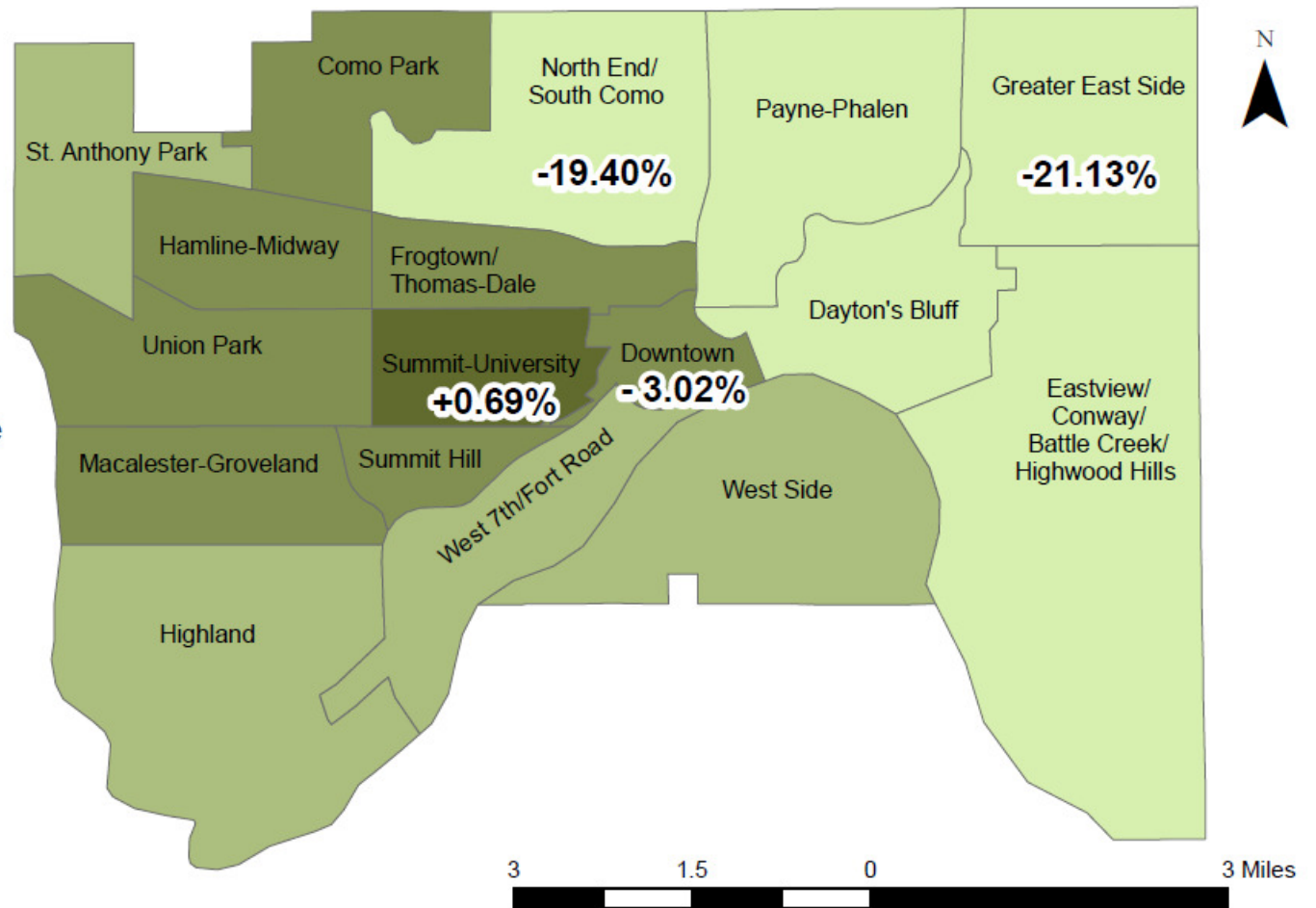

Change in Proportion White Population, 2000 - 2010

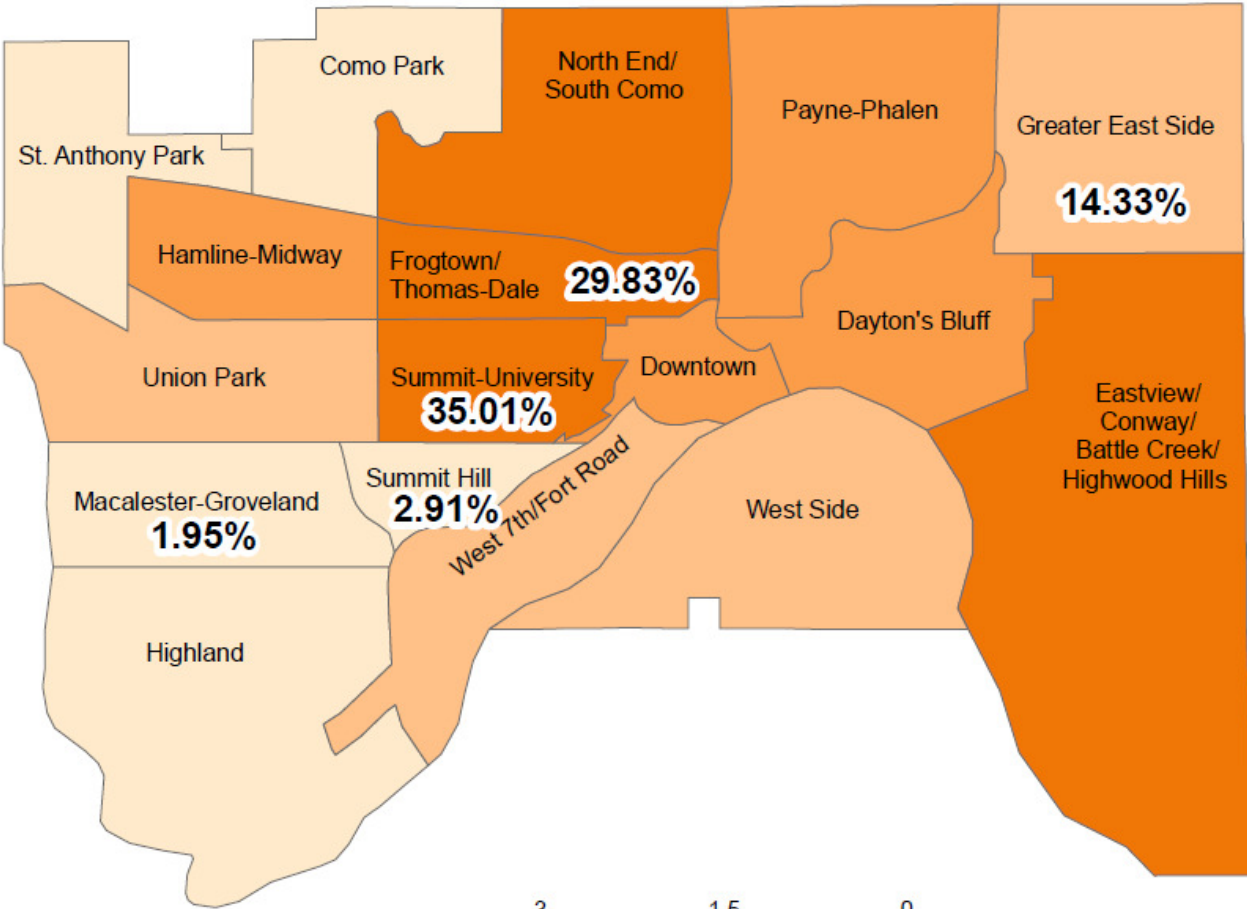
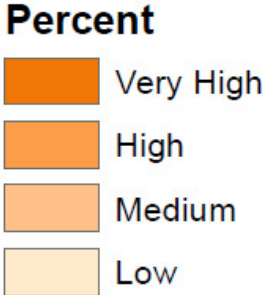

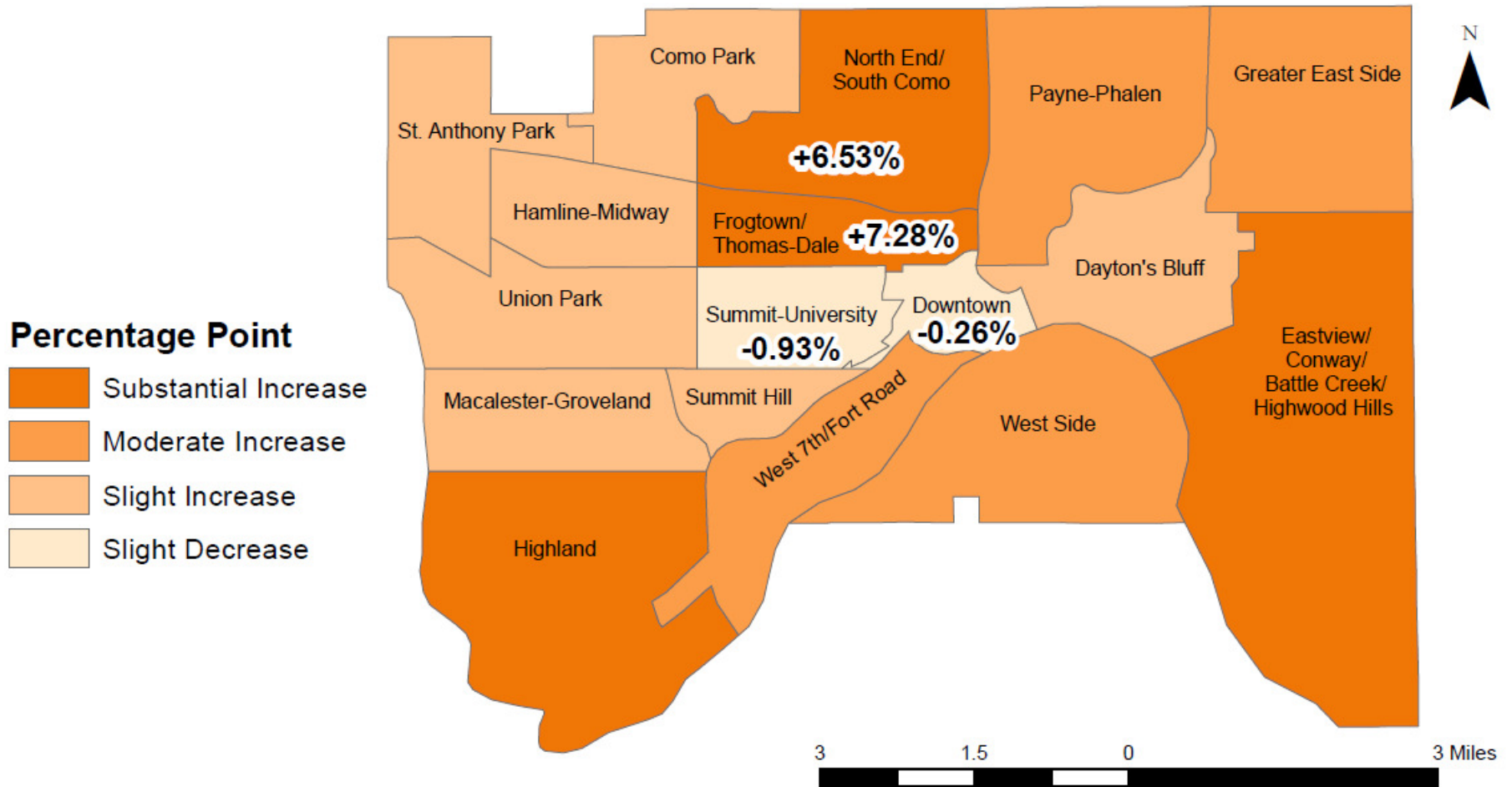


Proportion African American Population, 2010

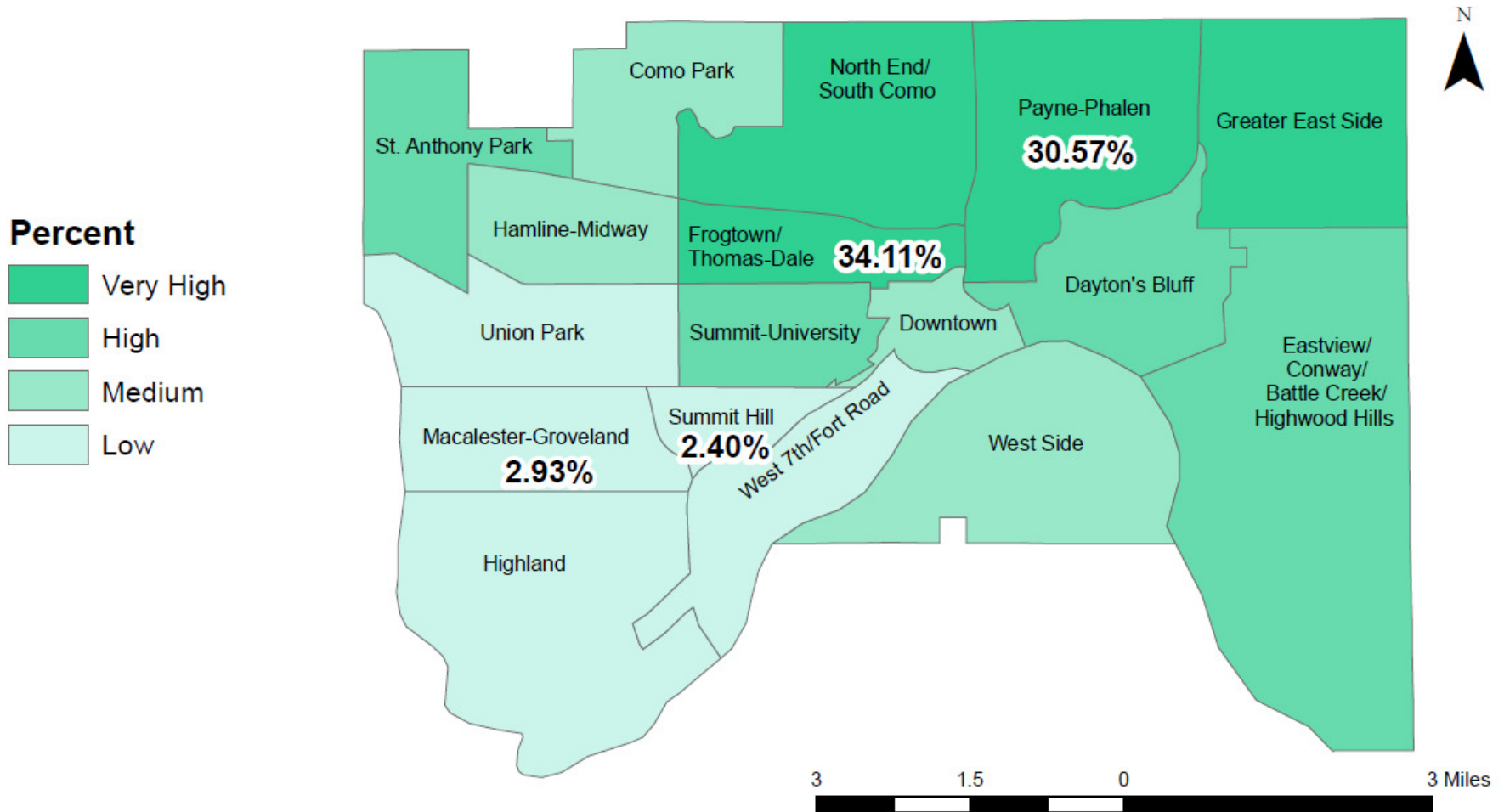


Change in African American Population, 2000 - 2010

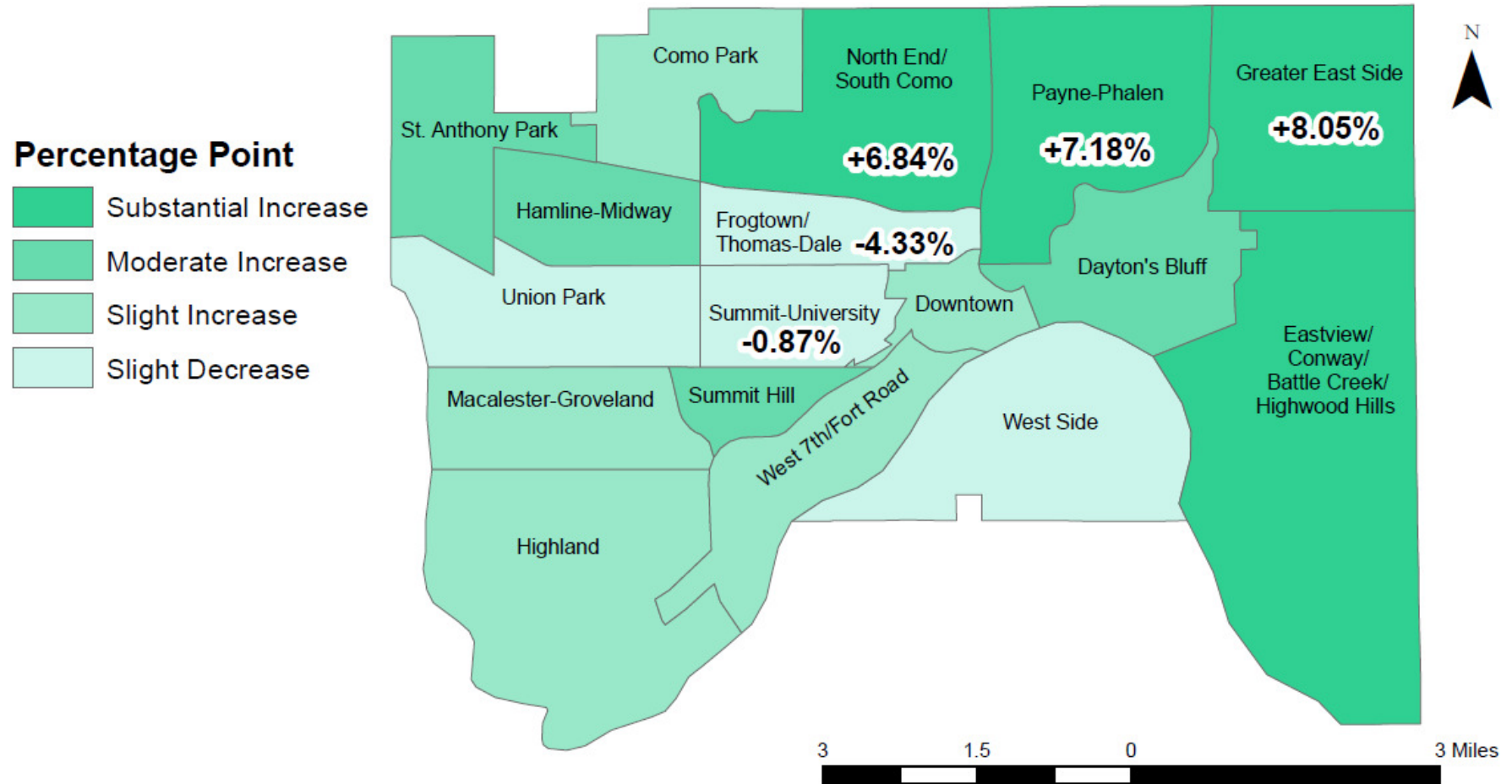


Proportion Asian American Population, 2010

Saint Paul 2010: 42,614 People, 2000: 35,500 People



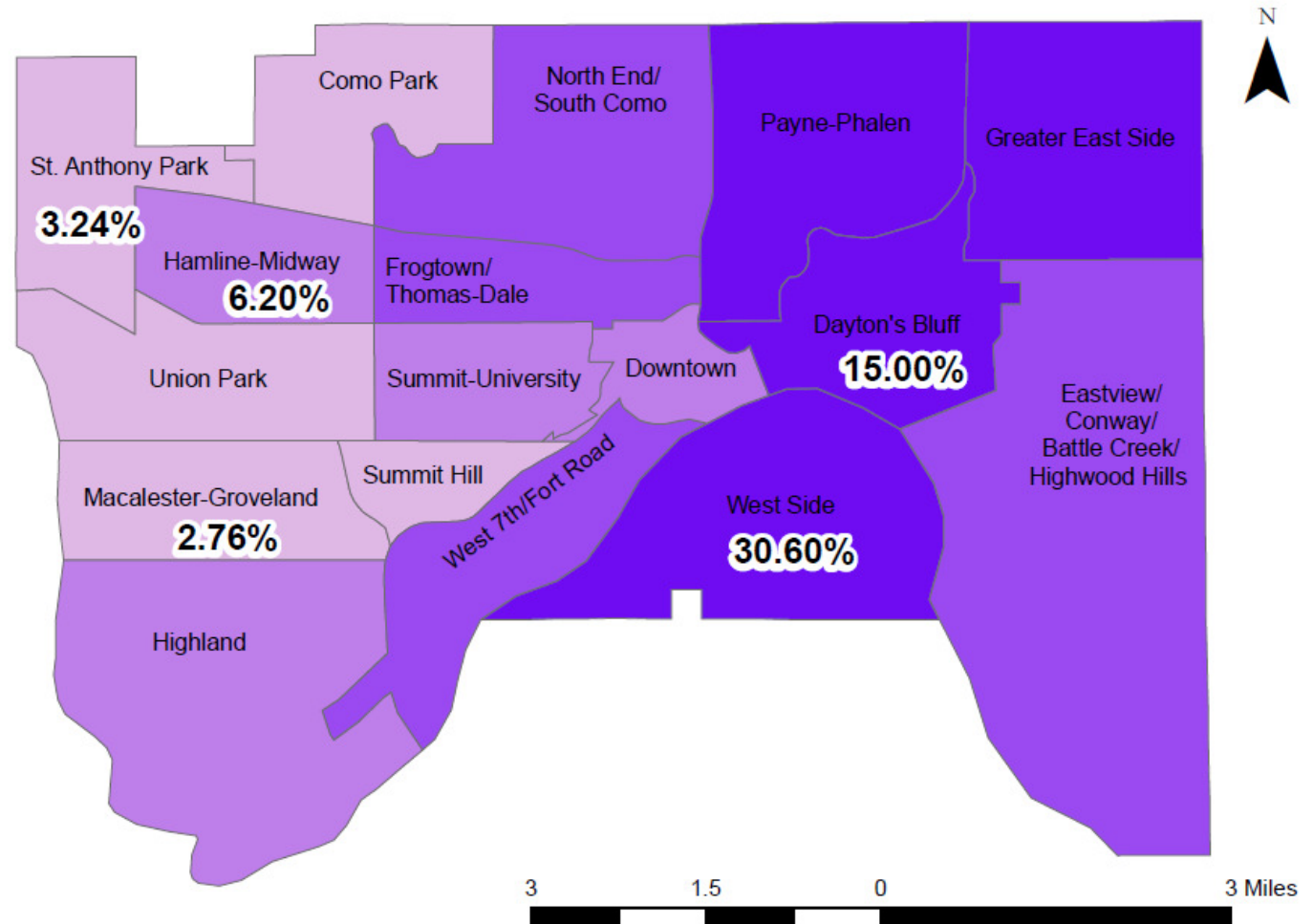
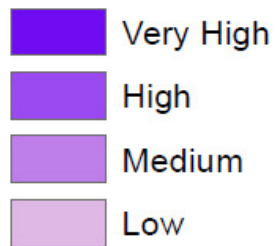
Change in Proportion Asian American Population, 2000 - 2010



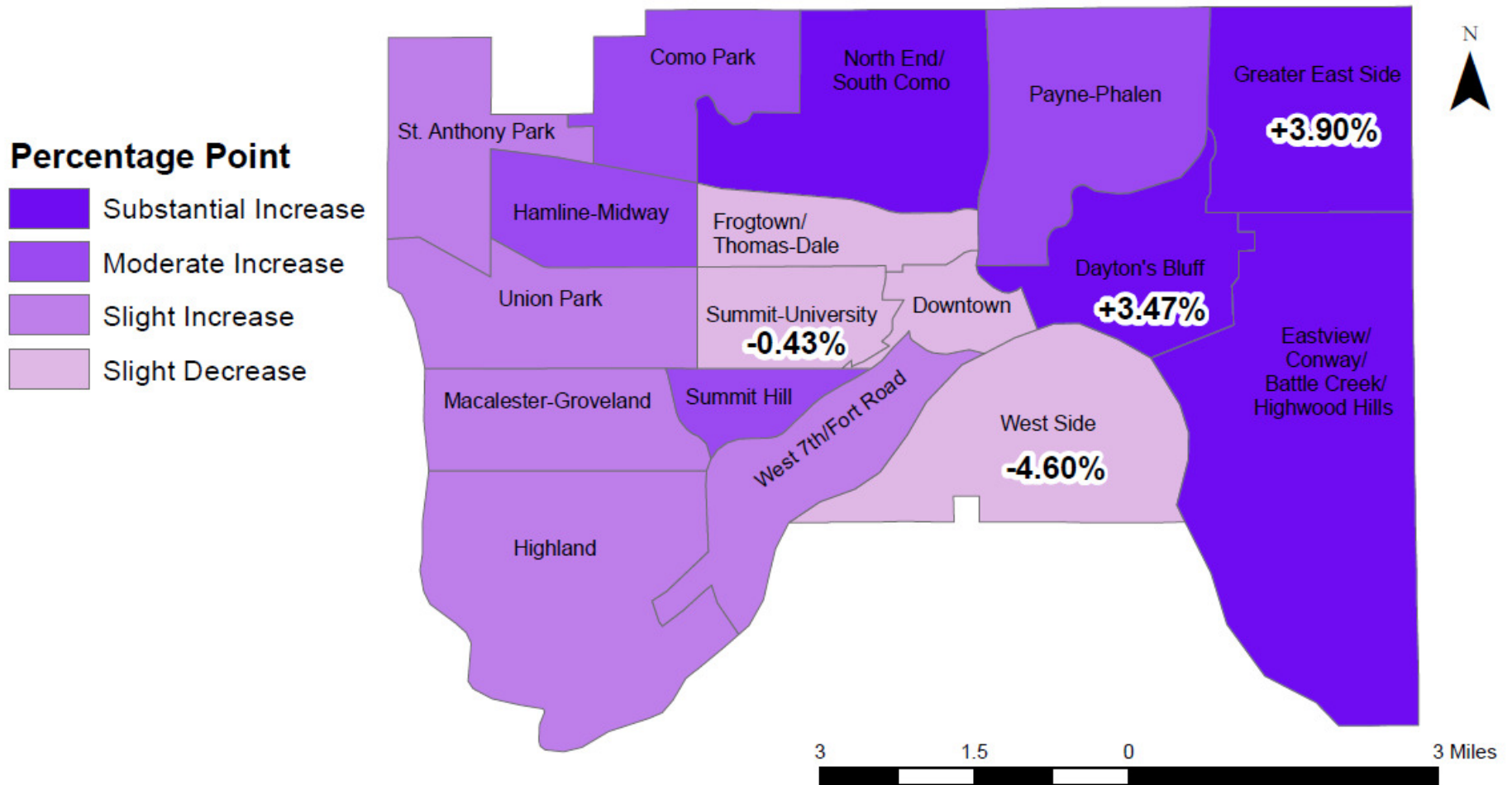
Proportion Latino Population, 2010

Change in Proportion Latino Population, 2000 - 2010



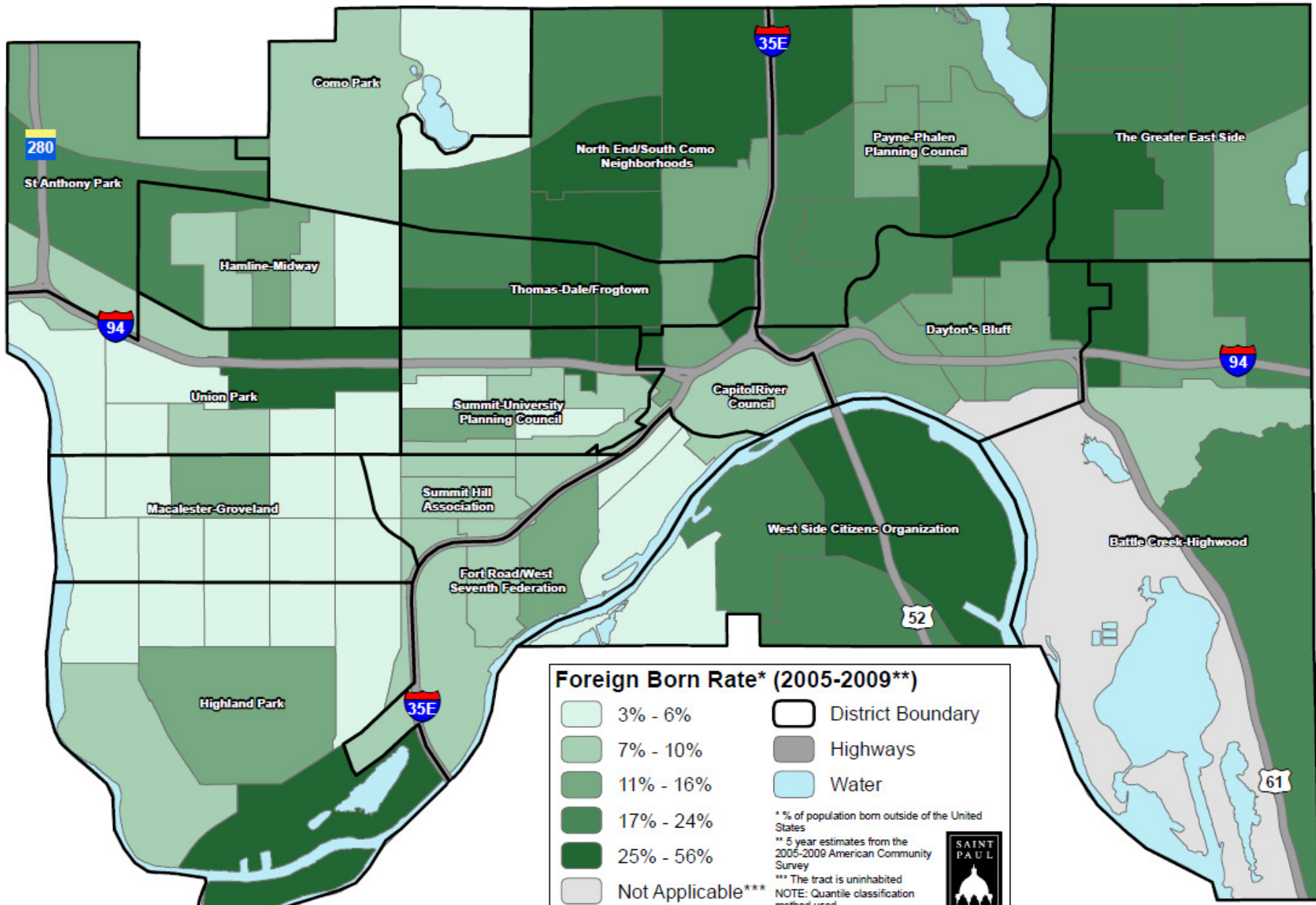

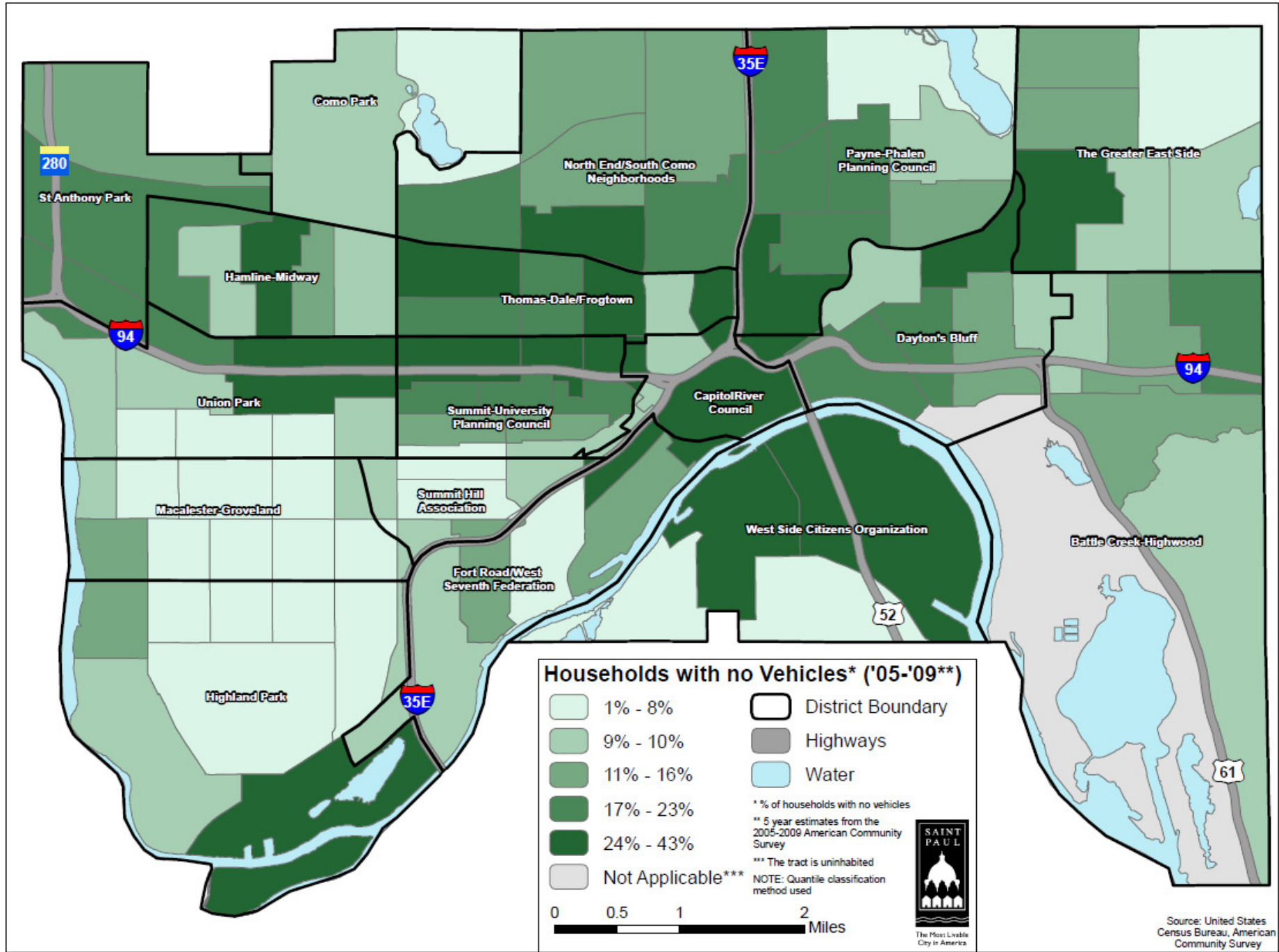

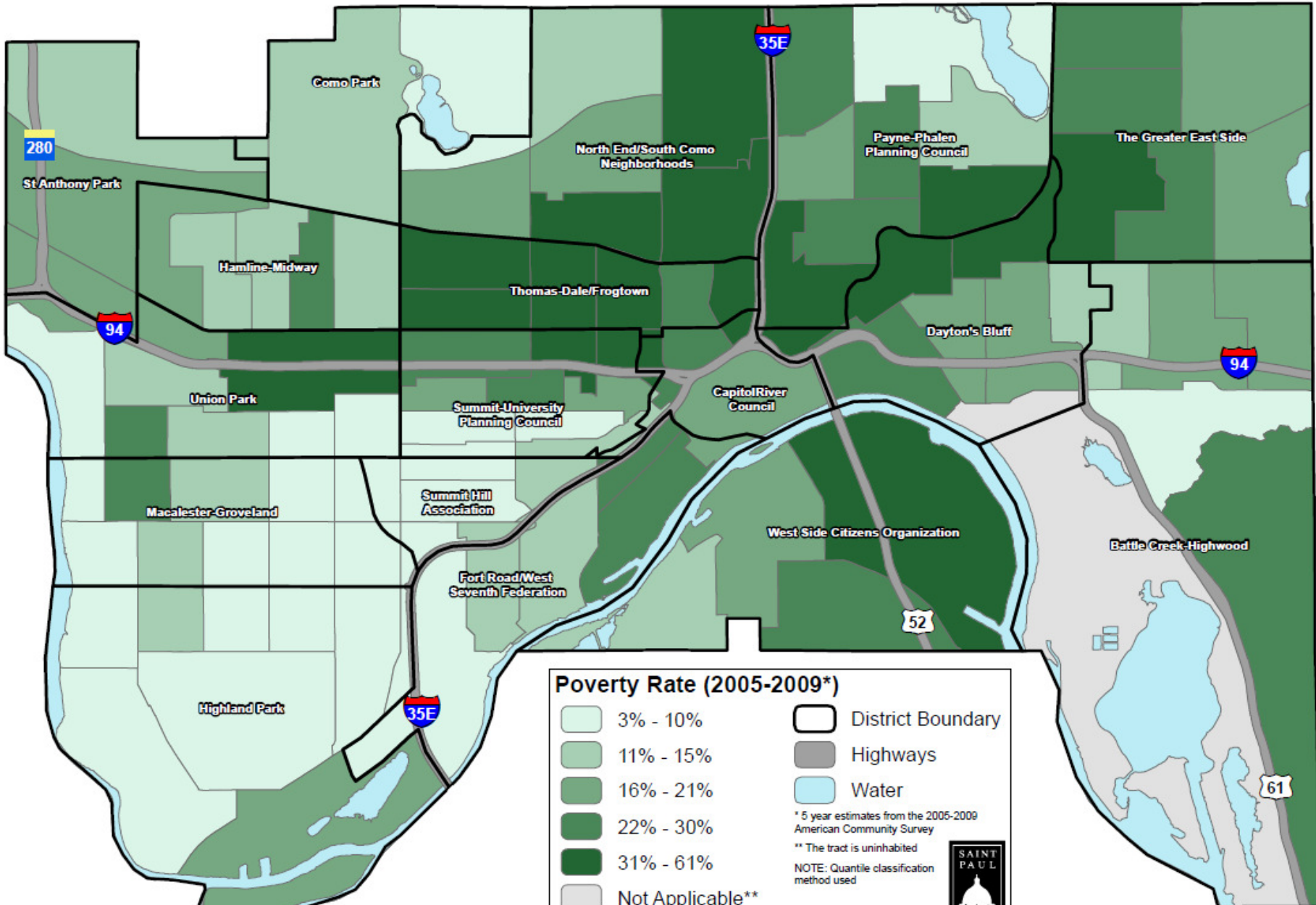

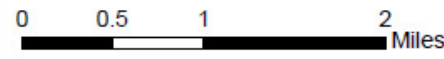




Poverty Rate (2005-2009*)
