Heading Home Ramsey: The Central Hub

Heading Home Ramsey, as the HUD-designated Continuum of Care for Ramsey County, coordinates the collective effort to end homelessness for our region. It unites over 100 partners from various sectors, including government agencies, nonprofit organizations, health care providers, and community groups, working toward a shared goal of providing effective support and housing solutions. The City of Saint Paul coordinates closely with this body to support our unsheltered neighbors.

Saint Paul Public Library

Saint Paul Public Library is committed to serving all residents of Saint Paul, including our unsheltered neighbors, through services and 13 spaces across our city and a Mobile Library.

All locations offer tools to support our mission of building a city that works for all, including mobile phone chargers, internet and Wi-Fi access, and public restrooms.

Residents without a permanent address can receive a welcome library card, which enables them to access library resources in person and online.

The library's social worker is available for drop-in and appointment access for all residents, regardless of their housing status.

The Familiar Faces Initiative

Within Heading Home Ramsey's framework, the Familiar Faces working group ensures a targeted approach to assist individuals who frequently use emergency services. This initiative, deeply integrated with city resources and efforts, focuses on:



Providing personalized, intensive support and service connection to address the unique needs of each individual within the Familiar Faces group.



Ensuring access to stable housing as a foundation for improving overall well-being and reducing reliance on emergency services.



Mirroring national models to set goals for significant outcomes, such as maintaining housing stability, reducing jail time, and lowering the use of emergency rooms and inpatient psychiatric care.



Prevention/Intervention, Environmental Design, Accountability/Outreach, Community Action, and Enforcement

Project PEACE is leading the response to end gun violence. Designed over months of collaboration with Saint Paul neighbors, Project PEACE unites community leaders, community first responders, social service providers and more to build a community of support and care around people who have been involved in gun violence — making future violence less likely.

CARES: Community Alternative Response Emergency Services

This Fire Department initiative delivers crisis intervention and nonemergency medical support, highlighting a shift toward a healthcentered emergency response.

HART: Homeless Assistance Response Team

This Department of Safety and Inspections team actively connects unsheltered individuals living in encampments with critical health and housing services, emphasizing personalized support to navigate the challenges of homelessness.

CROP Drop-In Hours at the Library

Tuesdays: 10 a.m. - 12 p.m. Rondo Community Library, 461 Dale Street North **Thursdays:** 10 a.m. - 12 p.m. George Latimer Central Library, 90 West 4th Street

Twice weekly at two locations, the library's Community Resource Outreach Program (CROP) hosts drop-in events with community, city, and county providers and connects unsheltered adults with service providers for assistance with housing, benefits, identification, health care, chemical dependency, and more.

Community Providers

A network of partners provides essential services ranging from emergency shelter access to comprehensive housing assessments and long-term support.
