Merriam Park: Design Advisory Committee Meeting #4 - Design Direction

Introductions:

o Participants:

- Lon Stousland: Resident on Marshall Ave, has lived in the neighborhood for 3-4 years.
- Richard Kim: Business owner near Merriam Park.

- Niko and Mary: Representatives from the City of St. Paul.

Agenda:

- Project Timeline: Discussion on the progress and potential check-ins during winter.

Key Discussion Points:

1. Existing Conditions:

- o Question about the tree canopy and whether there is an easement near the skatepark.
- Clarification on the public right of way and restrictions related to park property.

2. Design Trends:

 Concept Development: Positive feedback from the group, with mentions of connections to Robly and Nokomis Park (notably the contours and lake view).



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Dana emphasized improving the cross path to enhance the entrance.

3. Concerns:

- The rec center pathway is seen as unsafe. The group discussed making the space more connected and adding signage or plaques for intentional placemaking.
- Potential ideas include adding murals to the rec center's exterior walls.

4. Questions for Consideration:

- o Are there areas that need more attention?
- Ideas on how to utilize the park over the next 5, 10, and 25 years, with an emphasis on flexible, interconnected spaces.
- o Consideration of whether the tree canopy should stay (e.g., succession planting).

5. Baseball Programming:

- o Kids' baseball fields are in poor condition (bleachers are in rough shape).
- Discussion about parking along Roblyn and the need for a clear path from bleachers to the main path.
- The hillside offers a good view of both playgrounds and ballfields.

6. Next Steps:


- Once the consultant is on board, there will be another DAC meeting.

- Meeting concluded with appreciation for the opportunity.





















































Data & summary themes

* Feedback was received via precedent and priorities board from Ice cream, Peanut Butter & Jam event on September 21st 2024. Responses from participants are summarized in this document. All feedback received is valued and evaluated thoroughly.



Trends we heard

- Removal of sand at the playground.
- Accessible walking paths.
- Designating open spaces for flexible programming.
- More shade whether its shade trees or a shade structure.
- Separate area for a dog park with supporting amenities.
- Re thinking playground features to encapsulate different age groups.
- Water feature (Pool or Splash pad).
- Park pavilion with seating.
- Flexible sports field (having different line types for different sports).
- Updating the tennis courts with different striping for flexible use.

Supporting amenities *Other suggestions: Increase size of park, Winter Maintenance, Wider trails, and Improved Accessible Paths.












